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REPORT FROM THE RN21 MID-TERM CONFERENCE 2020 IN LUCERNE

Over the last decade, Europe has witnessed deep impacts of the economic crisis as well as ongoing challenges concerning refugees and migrant integration. In addition, new challenges are connected with climate change, labour market developments, processes of digitalization, the rise of populism, demographic changes and unknown consequences of Brexit. Suddenly, at the beginning of 2020, the Corona Crisis had to be added to this list as well.

Against this background, RN21 held its biannual midterm conference, titled "Quantitative Approaches to Analysing Social Change", from 9th -10th October 2020. Originally, the conference was supposed to take place in the picturesque city of Lucerne, Switzerland. However, the pandemic also disrupted the planning of this event, as with many others last year. Yet, new onlinesolutions to sudden offline-problems also create positive side-effects. With the strong Swiss Franc no obstacle to participating anymore, RN21's midterm conference attracted more than 100 researchers. Over the course of two days, 31 presentations were delivered across 9 sessions.

For the first time, the midterm conference also featured a Best Paper Young Researcher Award. The award was shared between Andrea Vega-Tinoco from the University of Zaragoza with a paper on active aging in Europe and Christoph Zangger from the University of Zurich with a presentation on improving survey weights for non-response.

Last, but not least, four high-calibre keynote talks enriched the midterm conference by giving exciting insights and by raising thought-provoking questions at the intersection of different fields of science. For example, Matthias Egger, President of the Swiss National Research Council and an epidemiologist by training, gave the opening talk on the untapped potential of the social sciences in understanding the political and societal aspects of the Corona crisis.




ONLINE CONFERENCE "OPEN SCIENCE AND REPLICABILITY IN THE BEHAVIOURAL AND SOCIAL SCIENCES", 2021

RN21 was partner of a one-day interdisciplinary online conference "Open Science and Replicability in the Behavioural and Social Sciences" of the Faculty of Human and Social Sciences at Chemnitz University of Technology on April 30 2021. The conference was dedicated to the increasing importance of Open Science scientific practice in the course of a new digital scientific culture and its impact on the scientific community. A total of 218 participants were registered, of which 55 were contributors, which we consider great success and further proof of the importance of the topic. The participants were an interdisciplinary and international audience from Australia, Germany, France, the Caribbean, Namibia, the Netherlands, Austria, Pakistan, Russia, Switzerland, Spain, the United Kingdom and the USA. A total of 8 posters and 15 talks were presented in 5 sessions and 3 workshops (see the programme at the conference website). The programme was framed by two prominent keynotes by Prof. Simine Vazire, PhD ("Where are the selfcorrecting mechanisms in science?") and Prof. Dr. Katrin Auspurg ("How to Further Replicability in Social Research Using Observational Data") and ended with closing remarks by Prof. Dr. Mario Gollwitzer.
